

2013 FIJI ACADEMY REPORT

Every January Fijis gather from across the nation to promote the values and best practices of our Fraternity and to prepare the incoming class of leaders for their roles in their respective chapters. For the last ten years, the Fiji Academy has taken place in St. Louis, and several weeks ago I found myself there alongside incoming President **Andrew Leach** ('14) and Recruitment Co-Chairman **Neil Blanchard** ('14). Together we had the proud privilege of representing Omicron.

Including close to 100 Graduate Brothers—many of whom are Field Secretaries, members of the IHQ staff, Archons, and other professionals in various fields—more than 600 Phi Gams met at the St. Louis Union Station Hotel for a weekend of fellowship and learning. On Friday, I attended three information sessions on the Essential Elements of a Chapter Scholarship Program, Fraternity Awards Best Practices, and the Qualities of a Successful Pig Dinner. These were three among several optional yet helpful sessions that were offered that afternoon.

Friday night I had the pleasure of participating in a ceremony that will stand out as one of my fondest memories of Phi Gamma Delta. Our Field Secretary, Josh Wiseman, reached out to me in December and asked if I would be willing to participate in a Model Initiation that would take place during Academy weekend. Although it sounded daunting, I could not help but accept his offer. After a few hours of rehearsal on Thursday and Friday, I was a part of a Ritual Team, composed of officers from Iowa State, Ball State, Ohio State, and William Jewell. Together we performed a full Initiation, granted with fake Initiates, in the presence of about 400 brothers. Acting as Historian for the ceremony, and the preparation it required, sparked some new-found excitement for returning to Charlottesville this semester and sharing with our brothers some of the things I learned.

The next day involved Officer Training, so Andrew, Neil, and I split up to spend time with other brothers in our respective positions. My track involved more fun—and what some would call "nerdy"—Historian information and advice which I am confident will help me perform my duties better in the next year than I would have had I gone without it. Much of our time was spent with the Fraternity Ritualist and the Curator of Archives, both of whom are obviously very knowledgeable in Phi Gamma Delta's past as well as
