HAZING PREVENTION SUMMIT

This past October, the University hosted a weekend-long summit on hazing prevention. All IFC fraternities sent undergraduate representatives, as well as graduate advisors and representatives from their respective (inter)national headquarters. Chapter President Andrew Leach, Chapter Historian Tim Hilliard, Purple Legionnaire Tommy Hayne, and OCHS President Nick Feakins represented Omicron at the summit, and Phi Gamma Delta Executive Director Bill Martin was also in attendance. Brother Martin was also able to visit the Chapter and meet several undergraduate brothers during his stay in Charlottesville.

Since 2008, the University has initiated formal investigations into fifteen fraternities and sororities in response to hazing allegations. The University received these reports from a variety of sources including calls from concerned parents, members of the community, faculty members, and University students. Last April, the Administration ordered all IFC fraternities to end their new-member pledge periods a month early in response to serious reports of hazing at several houses around Grounds. Omicron was not among the fraternities investigated for hazing. The Omicron Chapter, as well as the International Fraternity of Phi Gamma Delta, is proud of our no-hazing policy and have been consistently focused on the model IHQ program of building better brothers – not better pledges.

During the Summit, participants discussed factors that contributed to hazing at the University, how to prevent hazing from occurring, and how to develop alternative ways to achieve the goals

of pledging. In addition, the University now expects all IFC fraternities to: (1) Eliminate any new member activities that threaten the physical or emotional well-being of other students or cause discomfort in students; (2) Eliminate the required/coerced consumption or use of foods, beverages, or condiments in the new member process; (3) Eliminate any new member activities that involve the required/coerced consumption of alcohol; (4) Develop and execute a new member education plan that will result in the initiation of new members at least 2-weeks prior to the first reading day of the spring semester; and (5) Commit to sending an elected or appointed new member educator to meetings and training during the spring semester to further a student-led dialogue on hazing education and prevention.

While hazing is not a problem at Omicron specifically, and is already unlawful, Omicron strongly supports the Administration's efforts to prevent hazing and protect student safety. Since re-colonization, Omicron has built a strong, thriving, and cohesive brotherhood on top of our strict no-hazing pledging process. It is our hope that the Administration's efforts will gain ground in improving the public perception of Greek life at the University, and reinforce the existing model of self governance and mutual respect.

FIJI RUN ACROSS VIRGINIA: CHECK THEM OUT ON ROUTE 29!

I'm no traffic reporter, but anyone traveling down Route 29 Saturday can expect some delays. You won't need to worry, nobody is hurt. In fact, it's actually quite the opposite. Peoples' lives will be saved—all because of a group of men and a football.



The University of Virginia and Virginia Tech football game is a long-time rivalry in the NCAA. However,

before the coin is tossed, whistles are blown and sufficient trash is talked, the UVA and VA Tech chapters of Phi Gamma Delta (FIJI) fraternity put aside their allegiances to raise money for The V Foundation.

“We’re a national brotherhood,” says Clayton Betts, Co-Philanthropy Chair at UVA FIJI. “This gives us a chance to get to know these other guys and be a part of something with them.”

In the fall of 2003, both chapters created “FIJI Run Across Virginia” in which they run the rivalry game ball 157 miles from one school to the other. Proceeds and sponsors of the event are then donated to cancer research. Ten years later, these men have raised over \$370,000 and are gearing up for another record breaking year.

Next Friday morning, VA Tech members will leave Blacksburg with two police escorts and a charter bus filled with backup runners. One-by-one, the runners will make their way down Route 29 into Lynchburg, where they will pass the ball off to the UVA chapter. The UVA chapter will then run through the night to arrive at their stadium on game day.

“It’s something we’re all proud of,” says Doug Bowman, Football Run Chair at VA Tech FIJI. “It’s become our founding moment each year that we hang our hat on.”

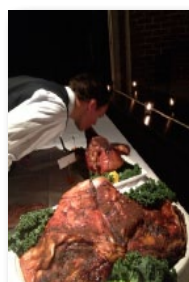
